before leaving to go to Montgomery to join freedom ride, and conditions of release
from prison was that they were no supposed to leave the state. Days had been in
the prison for 30 days for picketing without a permit. After extradition was in 2
days before bonded out Was still a student at Dillard during this and returned
there in June to take final exams after all other students had left
summer 1961 speaking tour in Chicago, New York with Jerome Smith
picketin in Washington July 4, 1961 with Wash CORE also during the summer was
elected regional rep by national conv or council

July 1961 back to Shreveport to organise a CORN chapter; first project was desegragation of bus terminal which they did, in the course of the project Dave was arrested for vagrancy, loitering etc in one instance he was arrested for "disturbing the peace" while sitting in a parked car; the officer said he was disturbing his peace by being there. It was also during this time that a small freedom ride came that through Shreveport led b ReW. B. Elton Cox, it had come from Arkansas and went to New Orleans. There was a hostile scene at the bus station in Shreveport with about 1000 whites, fortunately there was little violence.

During the summer at a banquet sponsored by Shreveport CORE at a church two bombs were thrown in the windows while Dave was addressing the banquet. No one

was injured but a part of the church burned. After the fire was aput out Dave

Dave had a plan at that time to use the 50 students as a "non-violent Army" and scatter them in Iouisiana and some in Miss. This was the forerunner of the existing COME Task Force. The national office didnot accept the idea at the time and when summer came the students left and the project apparently disintegrated more or less.

June 1962 went to Mississippi, that summer COFO was organized to work on on a state-wide bas is voter registration and as an instrument of getting grants from VEP, at that time there were only about half a dozen civil rights staff workers in the state Dave hired people out of his own salary and then with VEP money when it came. We He was working in Jackson, Hattiesburg, Greenville and Ruleville. Others involved then Were Lawrence Guyot, Bob Moses, Lafayette Surney, Landy McMair and James Jones Dave was arrested between 10 and 15 times during this period, mostly if not all were for various traffic offenses. One time he was arrested and the officer told him, when Dave asked what the arrost was for,"by the time we get to the jail Itll think of something. Prior to COFO there was the Jackson nonvilent Movement composed of CORE and SNCC, an instrument organization to involve the freedom ride students. It was generally in this period, June-December 1963 that the Miss. food program was organized, one of its first projects was to take food to people in the Delta who had lost jobs trying to register. Also Dave was one of those who first developed the idea of a community center, he along with Moses and James Bayal

Jamuary, Feb. March INEM 1963 Dave continued his general work, Greenwood was added. The quilt cooperative in Ruleville was organized. George Raymond worked there for a while before going to Canton. It was during this time, and earlier (also her home town) than Dave met his wife to be Matte EXE Bivins in Hattiesburg/where she worked for SNCC (2 yrs altogether) as Bob Moses' secretary.

April 1963 Dave went to Canton to start work there and in June George Raymond came down from "uleville to work Canton. During this period Dave recruited various people in the state to work or from outside the state to come and work, including:

Doris Castle, Annie Hoody, Jerome Smith, Jean Thompson, one of the Dearon boys from

June, July 1963 Dave worked in Jackson organizing the demonstrations at the request of the HAACP. He worked closely with EEE Medgar Evers and Dave remembers that the day he was killed he had been using Medgar's car all day in Canton and missed most the mass meeting that night. He returned that car that night and saw Medgar shortly before he (Medgar went home). Dave remembers that he left a pack of Kent digarettes in Medgar's car.

Fall 1963 sametime about here Dave was elected AssT Program director of COPO.

in the fall was the first freedom vote Aaron Henry for Governor, Edwin Eing for
Lt. Gov. After the freedom vote was over Dave turned himself in to the Jackson
police. He had been wanted for charges of contributing to the delinquency of
a minor since July (probably in connection with the Jackson demonstrations).

As it was not convenient for him to go to jail until after the freedom ballot,
he had to avoid the police for about four months, the measures to do that included
being smuggled out of Jackson in a car trunk. The police searched his apt, looking
for him, etc.

From Jan 1964 to November 1964 Dave served as the Asst Program director of cofo, an increasingly large job as COFO grew in size, preparing for the summer program. In January three workers arrived from New York, Dick Jewett and Rita and Michael Schwerner. Jewett was sent to Canton where he was put in jail for 32 days after he had been there less than 24 hours. Dave had by this time received approval from the national office is for his community center program and asked the Schwerners if they would like to work in the community center in Meridian. They agreed and went to Meridian only to find that there wasn't any community center at all, only five rooms empty rooms. They called him and asked him how they were to set it up; since there were no other centers in the state and they were about to establish the first one, there was little Dave could tell them. Perhaps that was best, because left on their \$\oldsymbole \text{ own, they established a beautiful center.} In \( \text{Decenter} \) 1964 Babe left missisippi to work in the CORE southern regional office as the southern program director.
