'Appalachia Speaks.

The members of the Appalachian Cadcus feel that the problems of our area have not been recognized by the Pre-Convention. Rural povertyn is rampant in Appalachia and we feel that the existing programs have been inadequate. We demand that the Convention support the proposals to be mentioned below, support the expansion of the existing povertyn programs as well as encourage the creationj of new ones.

- 1. We demand that this convention recognize and concern itself with POVERTY as a prime issue----which it has not done yet.
- 2. We demand that this convention initiate a petition drive for at least 3 million signatures to call for an investigation of all poverty programs, with the assurance that those programs which are not being controlled by and tenefitting the poor be turned over to the low-income people, and we demand that the convention support an end to the Appalachian States' governors' veto concernit prance of poverty programs. The need for poverty programs must be determined by the people and not by politics.
- 3. We demand that this conventionj provide organizers in Apparachia in order to give the people and active voice concerning welfare rights, job training, human rights, education, election reforms, tax reforms, and strip mining.
- 5. We demand support from this convention in the Appalachian Volunteers effort to obtain independent funding.
- 5. We demand that NCNP initiate a campaign 40 inform the American people of the harassment of certain groups, such as Southern Conference Education Fund, Southern Labor Action movement, North Nashville Student Program and Appalachian Volunteers, and that NCNP assist in the establishment of a legal aid organization for the deferral of these workers when needed.
