

STATEMENT OF AIMS
Student Mobilization Committee

It is two years since the U.S. government began bombing north Vietnam and expanding enormously the scale of destruction in south Vietnam. In Vietnam the war is being paid for by increasing bloodshed of American and Vietnamese soldiers, the increasing killing of Vietnamese civilians, and the destruction of their culture. At home the war is maintaining the oppression of the poor, forcing young men into war against their wills, and transforming high schools, universities, and research institutes into instruments of regimentation, militarism, and destruction. What is worse, it is sapping the democratic spirit by penalizing dissent and creating a state of moral numbness that is paving the way for even more massive and brutal Vietnams around the world.

This poses a challenge to those Americans who for the past two years have been striving to bring the horror of the war to the attention of their fellow citizens: for now large segments of America can be reached with the message that the war is a barrier both to their own individual happiness and to the fulfillment of the American dream of a nation with liberty and justice for all.

We must respond to this challenge by confronting our fellow students and our professors with the truth about the war and its perverse effects upon our society:

We must face the true nature of the war. It is a war of aggression against the people of Vietnam, calculated to thwart their efforts to determine how they will run their own society. It is an illegal war fought in our name without our consent. The war has become genocidal in its destruction of the Vietnamese people. It reflects the assumption that the people and resources of non-white countries are to be exploited by the white people of the world. Our policy in Vietnam reflects on an international scale the tradition that has oppressed the American Negro people -- the tradition of racism. It is but one symptom of a diseased society, a symptom that must be ended if it is to be possible to begin treating the disease itself.

We must face the true nature of the draft system. It assures manpower for destruction and frees the government from the necessity of justifying an aggressive foreign policy to those young men who are conscripted to kill. It converts the classroom into an arena in which the losers are sent out to kill and be killed and the winners must live with the knowledge that their "success" in school may mean another's death on the battlefield. The draft enables the government to continue to depend on the use of violence as a major instrument of international policy. It is the responsibility of the most powerful nation in the world to seek an alternative to this policy.

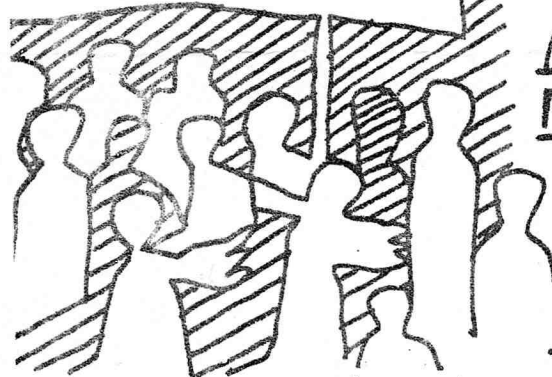
We, the Student Mobilization Committee, therefore urge all those high school and college students who wish to oppose the criminal war in Vietnam to dedicate themselves anew to the task of ending the war. We urge national student action around the following focal points:

- (1) Bringing the GI's home now.
- (2) Opposing the draft and supporting the right of individuals to refuse to cooperate with the military system.
- (3) Ending high school and college complicity with the war effort.

It is especially appropriate that we American students, fighting for the right to determine our own future, support the right of self-determination throughout the world and call for international opposition to the war in Vietnam, which denies the right of self-determination to the people of Vietnam.

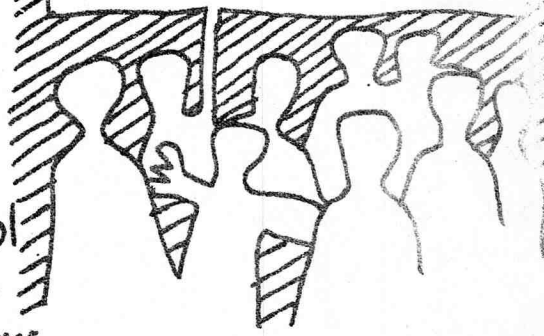

Proposals decided upon at Student Mobilization Committee Conference

A. Summer Proposals

1. Education

- a. expansion of the Student Mobilizer
- b. publishing an organizers' handbook
- c. establishing a speakers' bureau
- d. distribution of literature, films, tapes, etc.

2. Communicate antiwar information and build coalition with labor unions

3. Research and planning for activity against campus complicity.

4. Organizing a high school student mobilization committee.

5. Organizing antiwar caravans in each state.

6. Getting antiwar referenda on ballots in communities.

7. To investigate and support all cases of GI's opposed to the war and to send letters of support to Pfc. Howard Petrick and the Fort Hood Three. To give support to all veterans and reservists groups opposed to the war. Distribution of antiwar information to members of the Armed Services.

8. To coordinate demonstrations at napalm plants, defense factories, etc. Civil disobedience would follow after the original confrontation, along with local education.

9. Draft Resistance

- a. To oppose 2-S deferments.
- b. To support black resistance unions and to realize responsibility to organize draft resistance unions in white, middle class areas. To organize anti-draft sentiment in white communities. (motion from black students' caucus)

The following antidraft proposals were tabled favorably to Continuations Committee.

- a. To organize unions for draft resistance to do the following:
 1. direct action at induction
 2. education of potential inductees
 3. disruption at induction centers, recruiting, etc.
 4. encouragement of GI's to oppose the war.

There should be financial support from the SMC and the SMC should be a clearing house for information.

- b. for a summer anti-draft demonstration in Washington
- c. for nationally coordinated "we-won't-go" demonstrations
- d. for womens' anti-draft unions
- e. for mass civil disobedience on national and local scale
- f. for national anti-draft agitation
- g. conference to go on record as opposed especially to draft of black men.

B. Fall Proposals

1. Coordination of a national campus referendum on the war.

2. (For recommendation to the Spring Mobilization Committee) To hold a national March on Washington in the fall supported by international actions.
