They were refused service there and when they would not leave, they were arrested. The restaurant has a "white only" sign in the window.

We do not yet know the bond, but Dick has told his wife that he won't come out on bond. Iris says that if ~~if~~ Dick and Hansen don't come out today that there will be demonstrations at the restaurant today and probably more arrests.

Gregory was in Pine Bluff to speak at a mass meeting last night. About 900 people came to the meeting and it went very well.

a arraignment for Hansen and Gregory was this afternoon. They both pled not guilty. Their trial will be on Monday, Feb. 25, 11am. Bond is \$500 each, but Gregory has said he will not come out of jail until the trial ~~is~~ and he will not leave Pine Bluff until the Barbeque place is desegregated. They expect to begin demonstrations tonight or tomorrow ~~at~~ and hope that James Bevel, who is to speak on Sunday, will be able to come into Pine Bluff early. Also would like John or Jim to come into Pine Bluff.
