there). The others will be released as soon as the bond money is raised.

Hattiesburg: (from Bob Weil, Jackson)

This morning 43 people were arrested in Hattiesburg for attempting to picket
at the courthouse. Yesterday at about 4:30 the picketers were told that they
would not be able to picket any more and they were read the anti-picket law
that was signed on Wed. night at 5:15pm. The picketers stopped at 4:30
yesterday afternoon, but they attempted to resume picketing this morning.
A group of 37 went down and were arrested at 9:05am this morning. A second
group of 6 followed and were also arrested. Among those arrested were:
