Rest in Power, Nikki Giovanni (1943-2024)



EARLY LIFE

Born on June 7, 1943, in Knoxville, TN, Nikki Giovanni was raised in a suburb of Cincinnati, Ohio, and spent summers with her grandparents in Knoxville.

FISK UNIVERSITY & SNCC


In 1964, Giovanni restarted the Fisk chapter of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC), marking the beginning of her activism.

> Nikki Giovanni's leadership with SNCC solidified her commitment to the Black liberation struggle.




THE BLACK ARTS MOVEMENT

Giovanni's work became central to the Black Arts Movement, where she called for Black solidarity and revolution.



SPOKEN WORD ICON

Giovanni's spoken-word poetry, set to gospel music, reached mainstream audiences. Her first album won national awards and shaped a new generation of poets.



"Truth Is On Its Way" became a movement in itself.



HIP-HOP CONNECTION

Giovanni celebrated hip-hop as a continuation of the civil rights struggle, drawing parallels between 1960s poetry and rap lyrics.



In honor of Tupac Shakur, she tattooed "Thug Life" on her arm, symbolizing solidarity with the fight for justice.



TEACHING AT VIRGINIA TECH

For over 30 years, Nikki Giovanni shaped young minds as a professor at Virginia Tech.



Her wisdom extended beyond the page and into the classroom, inspiring future generations.
